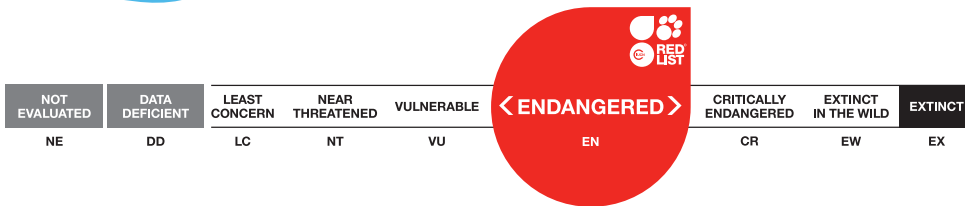


# LEARN AT CHESTER ZOO



**A very high risk of becoming Extinct in the Wild**

<b>Name</b>	Sumatran Laughingthrush.
<b>Scientific Name</b>	<i>Garrulax bicolor</i> .
<b>Threats</b> (why they're at risk)	Illegal poaching for the songbird trade. This is made worse by habitat loss.
<b>Distribution</b> (where they live)	Originally distributed along the length of Sumatra, Indonesia. However, recent evidence suggests they have become fragmented after undergoing considerable decline.
<b>Habitat</b> (what they live in)	Middle and lower stories of mountainous forests.
<b>Diet/Feeding strategy</b> (what they eat and how they eat it)	Mainly insects, including beetles and spiders.
<b>Social behaviour</b> (how they live)	Often found living in flocks and are very vocal. Breeding occurs February-September.
<b>Males and females</b>	No notable difference between males and females.
<b>Lifespan</b> (how long they live for)	Unknown.
<b>Number of young</b> (how many babies)	Two to three individuals.
<b>Interesting fact</b>	Considered to be cooperative breeders, meaning chicks receive care from additional group members as well as their parents.
